Greetings Friends

It is important to remember that although we value the integrity of the youth and families we serve and we serve them with passion through best-practices in the field, it is **you**, the community, who truly make our work possible and sustainable. In this regard, the past two years have been exceptionally kind to Cocoon House:

- Cocoon House experienced explosive growth in the number of youth served by the Advocates at U-Turn, our drop-in center in downtown Everett. Much of this increase was due to larger numbers of youth from diverse populations accessing services. Our street outreach, conducted by four Advocates who meet youth face-to-face in the community, has helped build trust with more highly marginalized street youth.
- After an exhaustive three-day federal audit of the agency, the reviewers gave us high marks in almost every area reviewed. Cocoon House receives generous support through a number of federal programs. The kudos were appreciated and will help us as we seek new federal funding through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009.
- After almost a year of joint planning by the Board and staff, the Board approved a three-year strategic plan designed to increase the agency's fiscal sustainability while increasing the number of high-risk and homeless clients benefiting from our services.
- In 2008, we began several badly-needed structural and cosmetic improvements to the Cocoon Complex, our transitional housing facility. The Complex now enjoys all new soffits, a metal railing, new decking on the second story, new windows, a fresh coat of paint on the exterior and secure and attractive gates at each entrance.

• In May 2009, we hosted the groundbreaking ceremony for Cocoon House East (Monroe).

Construction is moving forward with a Board commitment to LEED standards for the facility. Cocoon House is the first nonprofit in Snohomish County to address environmental awareness and “going green” as part of our efforts to care for homeless youth in the county.

In closing, we'd like to remind you that sometimes our name does not fully encompass the county-wide services we provide. Since 2008, we have been serving youth at Cocoon House North (Arlington). With Cocoon House Central, Cocoon Complex and U-Turn in Everett, Cocoon House East Grand Opening in 2010, the ever increasing need for prevention services and more outreach efforts in South County, perhaps *Cocoon Houses* is a more apt representation of the impact we are having in all of Snohomish County.

Everyone is experiencing the downturn in the economy and the vast changes taking place in American politics and society. Cocoon House is no exception. Now, with the support of a full-time Finance Director, Cocoon House is fully prepared to manage the growth and change we have enjoyed since we last reported to you —our generous community of donors, partners and volunteers.

Helping Teens and Strengthening Families in Snohomish County for over 18 years

Cocoon House provides critical services to homeless and at-risk youth and their families with the goal of stopping homelessness before it happens. Cocoon House has been Snohomish County's only resource focusing exclusively

on youth homelessness since 1991. We approach youth, families and caregivers with compassion, unconditional regard and respect. Cocoon House seeks to promote healthy growth, self-acceptance, home, empowerment and a sense of belonging. We believe that every child deserves a home and the opportunity to achieve his or her fullest potential. Through the years, Cocoon House has grown into an all-encompassing, continuum of services that strengthens families while helping teens reclaim their youth and discover their strengths. This enables them to face the future with stability, dignity, and purpose as they become self-sufficient young adults. Our services include emergency

shelter, long-term transitional housing, supportive community-based housing, case management and advocacy, prevention and education.

Some of the services we provide:

Short-term shelters:

Cocoon House North (Arlington), Cocoon House East (Monroe – Grand Opening 2010), and Cocoon House Central (Everett) provide respite to teens age 13-17 in crisis. Teens receive help to meet basic critical needs and are supported by caring, knowledgeable staff committed to helping teens find solutions.

Transitional housing:

Cocoon Complex (Everett) provides housing for teens with longer-term shelter and service needs. Compassionate, skilled staff are available to residents 24 hours a day to provide a home away from homelessness. On site services include: mental health and substance abuse counseling, case management, life skills training, as well as education and enrichment activities.

Supportive community-based housing:

Cocoon Project Ladder offered youth ages 18-21 an alternative to homelessness. Through the support of Snohomish County Human Services, Cocoon House administered Project Ladder for youth aging out of the foster care system through October 2009. Clients received housing and intensive case management. Programs aimed at long-term self-sufficiency through educational, vocational, employment, financial literacy and life skills training were also provided. Cocoon House continues seeking ways to effectively serve youth nearing adulthood - an age group often unable to access the services they need to bridge the gap between childhood homelessness and adulthood hopefulness.

Outreach, case management and resources:

The Cocoon Advocate Program offers mobile outreach for youth ages 13-21 in Snohomish County. Advocates work one-on-one with youth in their own community—at home, in school, or on the street. Advocates respond to the needs of teens, provide ongoing case management and connect them to services in the community. U-Turn Resource Center (Everett) provides a place where youth can go to access these services, address basic needs and receive immediate assistance.

Prevention and support for parents:

With an ultimate goal of preventing youth homelessness before it happens, Cocoon House works directly with parents to strengthen relationships between parents and their teens. Cocoon Project SAFE provides intervention and support to parents of youth through phone consultations and educational workshops. Cocoon WayOUT is an interactive workshop where parents and their teens work together on communication, decision-making and developing empathy. Our Prevention Program is featured on page four.

Our innovative and unique prevention services help parents of teens through phone consultations, parenting classes, weekly support groups and two-day behavioral seminars designed for both parents and teens. Families can discover solutions in order to face the future with stability, dignity, and purpose. These resilient youth and hard-working parents and families are truly inspirational.

Ultimately our goal is to stop homelessness before it happens. If homelessness does happen, we try to reunite youth and their families whenever it is possible and safe to do so.

Our work in prevention is sometimes our best kept secret. It shouldn't be. With a little love and support, Cocoon House saves lives and restores family unity.

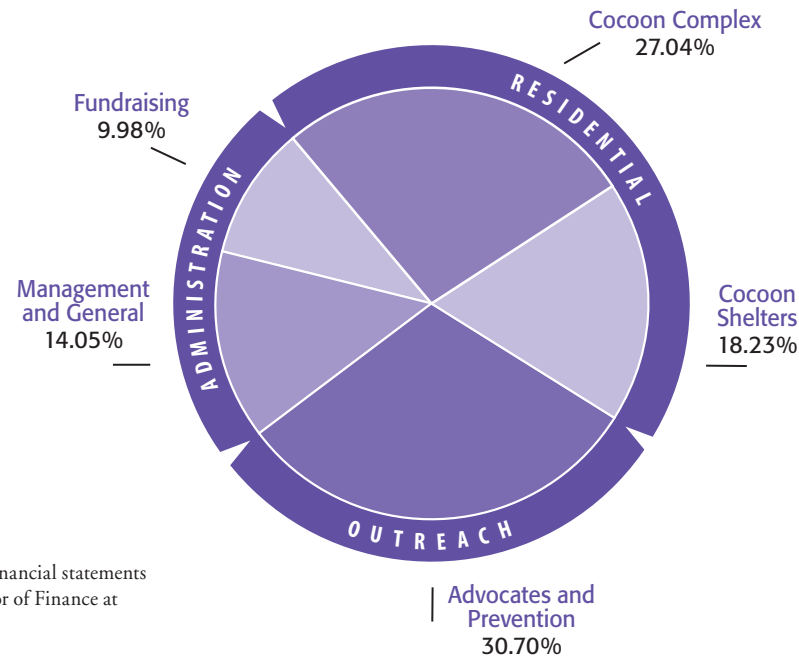

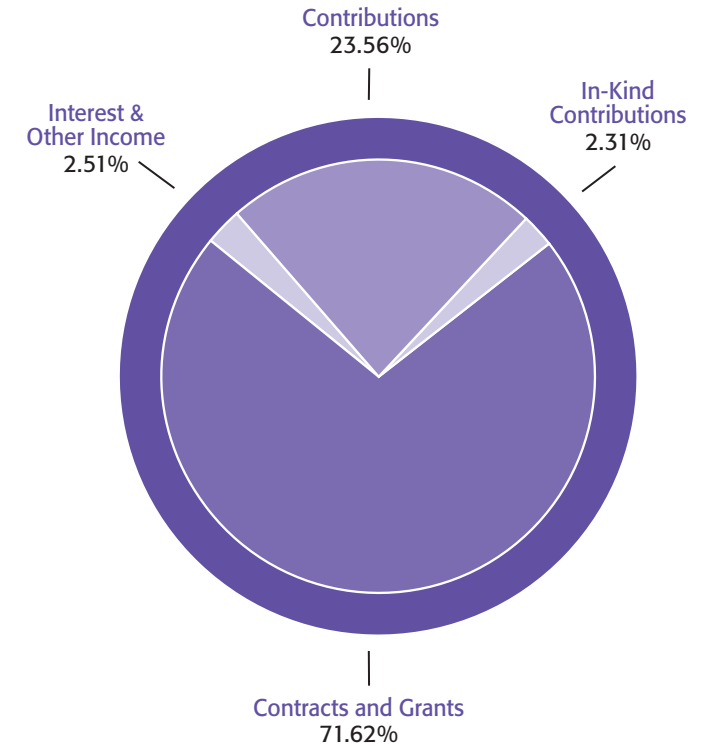

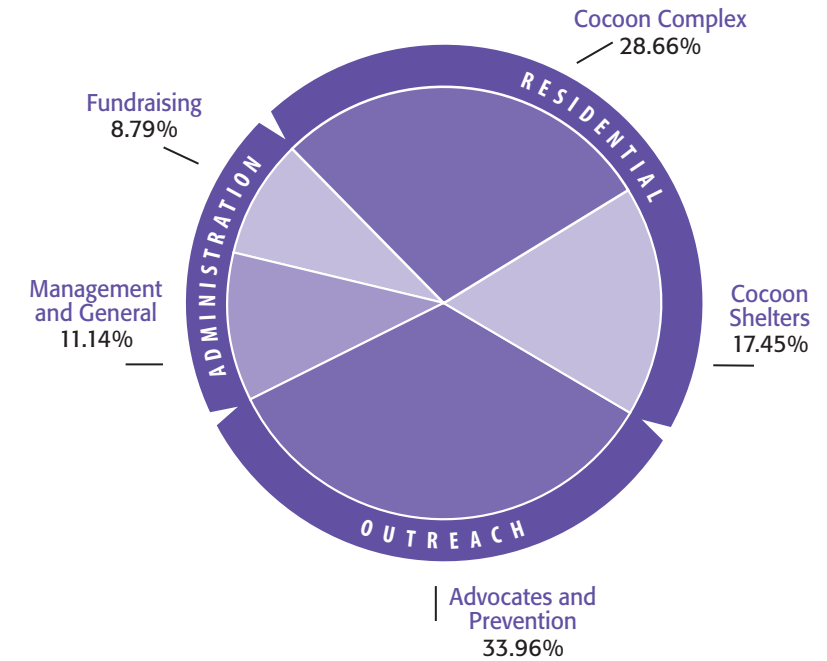
