What success looks like at Cocoon House

At Cocoon House we have been overjoyed to watch young people succeed in every program across the agency. However, it would be sharing only part of the story to talk about what youth CAN do with strong collaborations and trained staff support, when one of the biggest threats to the agency and the youth we serve comes from limited affordable housing and dwindling staff resources.

Limited housing options for young people experiencing homelessness is nothing new, but the scope of the housing shortage and the competition for housing is unprecedented in Snohomish County. Compounding the challenge is the growing lack of supportive personnel inside housing programs. Effectively working with young people requires time and trust. As much of the workforce around us has shifted focus toward more flexible work from home options or higher paying jobs to keep up with inflation, the pool of dedicated candidates committed to the kind of work we do has diminished.

Late last year, we were thrilled to see Snohomish County approve a 1/10 of 1% sales tax increase to help address long term challenges around affordable housing and behavioral health. These resources are truly vital to maintain critical services to our most vulnerable residents. However, as the population grows, behavioral health needs increase, and the costs of living/inflation steadily rise, we need to make additional strides, maybe even leaps and bounds in supporting viable housing and workforce options for all.

Building community is a core value at Cocoon House. We envision a community where our clients, staff, supporters and friends have access to the housing they need. Thank you for considering ways to provide a steady stream of support to

proven housing programs and services for our area's most vulnerable residents. I urge you to consider ways to support wage growth in our 24/7 sitebased housing programs where reliable staff are vital to our ability to function, and I thank you for investing in the career development and housing opportunities of future social workers, clinicians, overnight residential staff and counselors.

Community is about coming together for a common purpose. For us to break the cycle of homelessness for young people in our community the way forward is by supporting the development of affordable housing and investing in wage growth in our sector. Stay tuned this fall when we will be sharing more ways you can get involved in shaping the policies which will support Snohomish County youth and families.

Connections Host Homes

Recently we housed a pair of siblings, aged 12 and 16 years old, who needed hands-on support during their stay due to severe neglect from a legal guardian. Our case manager gently provided basic life skills, things as simple as how to use hygiene products and how to eat when sitting at a dinner table using utensils. She also made sure they saw a doctor, a dentist and scheduled assessments for them as there was indication that they were on the spectrum. When the youth were leaving their host home stay, they were not able to return to the legal guardian, but were taken into protective custody to put supports in place and continue assisting them with basic needs. A school staff let us know that while they were in the host home, the 16 year-old was happy and smiling at school—a big change from how things had been for her previously.
